The town of Illesheim is a small German town in the state of Franconia with a population of about 4,000 people. It is located about 45 minutes from the historic city of Nuernberg and two hours from Frankfurt. Storck Barracks is named in honor of Colonel Louis J. Storck, U.S. Army. For thorough history of the installation check our web page or our booklet "A self-guided tour of Illesheim and Bad Windsheim" available from ACS.

Currently Storck Barracks serves as the Headquarters for 11th Aviation Regiment. The 11th AVN mission is to provide support to V Corps. Major units stationed here are 2/6 CAV, 6/6 CAV, and HHD and A Co 7-159th AVN REGT.

YOU NEED TO INPROCESS THROUGH 64TH REPLACEMENT IN RHEIN MAIN AIR BASE, FRANKFURT EVEN IF YOU HAVE A PIN-POINT ASSIGNMENT.

The 64th replacement is located at the Frankfurt Airport, on the military side. The 64th will begin your processing and cut orders for your new duty station. Their goal is to ship you and your family, on the sponsorship bus (S-bus), to your new unit the same day you arrive. However, American or German holidays may prevent same day shipping. If you arrive on the weekend at Frankfurt the 64th Replacement will accommodate you for the weekend and you will inprocess on the first duty day.

On arriving in the community the Inprocessing Training Center (ITC) personnel will greet you. They will give a short briefing and take a few documents to begin your inprocessing. You will receive a welcome packet and USAREUR drivers license study guide. After the briefing you will meet your sponsor who will take you to your temporary or permanent quarters. The next duty day is unit inprocessing. Your sponsor will assist you in all aspects of unit inprocessing. ITC will last for the next 10 duty days.

Storck Barracks is located approximately 200 miles SE of Frankfurt. If you are arriving by commercial air transportation into Frankfurt Int'l Airport, there is a shuttle service seven days a week between the airport and Rhein Main. Go to the military liaison located in the international baggage claim Area B in Terminal 1 to get information on times. The 64th Replacement will inprocess you and get you on a bus to Illesheim. Once in Illesheim the in/out processing personnel will pick you up along with your sponsor.

If you are driving from Rhein Main Air Base, Frankfurt, exit the post onto A5 towards Frankfurt/Kassel and turn on to A3 W rzburg. Get on A7 Ulm and get off at the Bad Windsheim exit. Follow the signs towards Bad Windsheim on 470. The post is located in the village of Illesheim. On your right hand side, follow the sign to Storck Barracks.

Servicemembers will need their orders, 201 file, dental, medical and educational file and leave form. A checklist will be issued with inprocessing instructions. Servicemembers must report in duty uniform.

- * Any previous school records, last report card
- * Power of Attorney is required if the sponsor is unavailable to preregister his/her child.

SCHOOL DRESS CODE AND DISCIPLINE POLICY EFFECTIVE 31 AUGUST 1998

1. Clothing will be clean, neat, serviceable (no holes, tears, slits deliberately cut, frayed or ragged), and worn properly.

2. Students will not be allowed to attend class(s) if inappropriate clothing is worn to school. Parents will be notified immediately to bring in appropriate items of clothing. Items such as sunglasses, gloves, hats, jackets, etc. may be confiscated and can be reclaimed at the end of the school day. Students are expected to store these items in their locker. The following items will not be worn.

a. Extreme or provocative styles of dress including bare midriff, mesh shirts or tops, tube tops, halter tops, tank tops; blouses, shirts or skirts made of see-through materials; skirt lengths shorter than mid-thigh; gym shorts or shorts not considered dress shorts; tops or T-shirts designed as under clothes; sports tank tops worn alone (over a T-shirt is acceptable); No skirts or dresses with slits past mid-thigh; No bra-less look; No backless or strapless dresses; No exposing of any underclothing (bra, underwear, sports bra); spandex type dresses or spandex shorts; beach wear; No ill fitting clothing-too large or too small.

b. Clothing that encourages or promotes cigarettes and other tobacco products, beer/alcohol, or drug use will be worn. This includes symbols and brand names.

c. Clothing or accessories that (1) depicts or promotes violence (2) suggests racial prejudice using symbols, graphic or words (3) has printed obscenities in graphics or words (4) depicts sexual connotations will not be worn. This also includes spiked clothing and collars, pins and buttons, metal chains attached to

any article of clothing, belt loops or wallets where the chain hangs loose from the body.

d. All hats or any head covering (including stocking caps, bandanas, nylons, hairnets, caps, sun-visors), gloves and sunglasses will not be worn or carried in the school building at any time.

e. Foot-wear that would be considered unsafe or unsanitary: flip flops, shower shoes, bedroom slippers, thongs or sandals without heel straps. Athletic shoes or boots that are manufactured with buckles, shoe strings, or clasps, will be buckled, clasped or tied securely to the foot at all times.

f. Belts will be secured inside the belt loops. Pants without belt loops must be able to stay up at the waist without use of a belt. The waist-line is defined as 2" below the navel. An extra long belt, where there is more than 6 inches of belt from the buckle, is not allowed.

3. It is not allowed for shorts, sweats, pants or hip huggers to be pulled down below the waist-line (2" below the navel) or sagging regardless of what the student may be wearing under them or over them. Jumpers and overalls must be fully worn with all side fasteners buttoned or zipped and with both straps on the shoulder.

4. For appropriate length of shorts, dresses and skirts: extended both arms down besides the legs. The hemline should extend below the longest fingers of both hands, or measure 5 inches from the middle of the knee cap.

5. Any clothing, hats, bandanas or other paraphernalia that is worn in such a manner as to represent or indicate gang affiliation is not allowed, and includes the following:

a. A right or left shoe untied with laces hanging loose.

b. A right or left pants leg rolled up.

c. A glove worn on a right or left hand.

d. A right or left sock pushed down into the shoe/boot.

e. All handkerchiefs/bandanas displayed (tied to a belt-loop, wrapped & tied around a leg or arm) to reflect gang affiliation.

f. Extra long belts, or material used as a belt, where the length hangs on either the right or left side of the body.

g. "Paraphernalia" may include jewelery, tattoos(should be covered), hair do's, eyebrow shaving, etc.

6. Gang related items will be confiscated, reported to the Military Police, and return only to the parents.

7. Any items associated with potentially illegal activities will be turned over to the Military Police.

This dress code is not designed to inhibit students in self-expression in any way, but is designed to ensure a safe, considerate, and non-distracting academic environment. " Dress for success."

PETS are allowed in long-term temporary housing and some guesthouses. Restrictions exist for pets in military housing. Domestic animals such as dogs, cats and small caged animals (birds, hamsters, guinea pigs, rabbits, mice and rats) are authorized in housing. You may have no more than two large pets. No pet can weigh in excess of 90 pounds. No more than three smaller pets may be kept at one time. There is no limit on birds and fish. Wild and exotic animals such as ferrets and snakes are not authorized. Pets have to be kept on a leash when outside. All animals must be registered with the post veterinary facility in Wuerzburg within one month of arrival. The veterinary hold monthly clinics in Illesheim. Call ACS to schedule an appointment.

Shipping your pet will be at your expense. AMC flights will transport some pets (at a cost to you), but due to weight restrictions and limited space this is not always an option. Be prepared to ship your pet commercially. You may consider calling several airlines to get price estimates just in case you cannot get your pet on an AMC flight.

Be sure you meet your pet's plane promptly if you are not traveling with your pet. Facilities for caring for your pet at the airline terminal are poor and you will be charged excessive "boarding" charges if they retain custody of your pet for even one hour. Ensure flights DO NOT stop over and DEPLANE IN GREAT BRITAIN as this would cause the pet to be put in quarantine for a very long period. Check with your local vet for more information. Refer to the pet information under the Relocation category.

There are some important documents to hand carry. You need to be sure to hand carry them with you on the plane.

- * Passports for every member of the family.
- * Birth certificates for your children in order to register for school.
- * Social Security numbers.
- * Previous school records for children and spouse if seeking employment or continuing studies.
- * Shot and medical records.
- * Vehicle registration, title and extra set of keys.
- * Household goods inventory list.
- * Pet health certificate and shot record.
- * Updated SF-171 if applying for DoDDS (Department of Defense School) positions.
- * Professional certification.
- * Volunteer career portfolio.
- * Special Awards or honors.

As full JTR is authorized, only limited furniture support is available on loan for 90 days or until your HHGs arrive. However, major appliances such as dishwashers, washer and dryer, range etc. are available through the Housing Division for on-post housing and command sponsored personnel living off-post.

WHAT TO BRING VS WHAT TO STORE:

LINENS - Bed linens, blankets, pillows, and towels. Plan to bring or mail/ship these items to save unnecessary expense.

LAMPS - Bring them. To convert to 220 all you need is a 220 light bulb and a plug adaptor.

CURTAINS - German curtains and drapes are hung from the ceiling not from the wall. They are, therefore, longer than the average American curtains. American curtains can be easily adapted by sewing a special hanging tape to the upper edge of the curtains. The only difference then is that the floor length American drape (about 80") is going to be approximately a foot off the floor since German curtains usually reach about 92". Drapes are supplied if needed, to all quarters in limited color selection.

RUGS - Bring all that you will need since many economy houses have no carpeting and government quarters are only partially carpeted. Carpets are available for sale at the PX.

SMALL APPLIANCES - Many people store their 110v appliances and buy 220v appliances here. Others use their 110v appliances with transformers. It is not recommended to bring high value appliances such as kitchen centers since operation on a transformer can reduce the life of an appliance. Do not bring 60 cycle items such as clock radios, etc. if you plan on living off post. If one lives on post, quarters are 110v and most items will work without

difficulty. The best appliances are those that are dual voltage (110/220). **STORAGE SPACE ITEMS** - Bring any shelves, book cases, chests, or hanging racks that you may want. Remember, there are not built-in closets in off post housing.

CLOTHES - Bring items for hot, cold, and rainy weather. Illesheim's climate is ever changing. Temperatures in the summer are 55-80 degrees fahrenheit and the nights are cool. Temperatures in the winter are 10-50 degrees fahrenheit with fog and frost very common.

SPORTING EQUIPMENT - Bring bikes, tennis racquets, golf clubs, fishing equipment, camping equipment, etc.

CRAFT SUPPLIES - available in very limited supply. Bring catalogs as supplies on the economy may be expensive and sometimes non-existent.

The newly arriving soldier and family members should be aware that the Army Community Service Relocation Assistance Program has a Lending Closet designed to make your transition into our community an easier, more pleasant experience. Our Lending Closet provides essential items for the PCSing family while they are without household goods. Items provided include: pots and pans, dishes, silverware, irons, ironing boards, toasters, coffee pots, vacuum cleaners (for 1 week periods), porta-cribs, high chairs, infant car seats and strollers. TRAFFIC - U.S. military personnel, civilians and their family members are governed by both German Traffic Laws and Military Traffic Laws. Seatbelts are mandatory for all passengers in a vehicle. German Road Traffic Regulations require that children under 12 years of age and shorter than 4'11" use a certified and suitable child restraint device when being transported in a vehicle. ACS has a flyer with the different child restraint systems by category.

GERMAN SAMARITAN LAW - The German criminal code states that every driver who comes upon an accident is obligated to render aid so long as this is reasonably possible. If you do not render aid you may be punished with imprisonment not exceeding 1 year or by a fine.

VEHICLE CHECKS - Illesheim is an open post. Safety checks are made to ensure that seat belts are worn and that child car seats are used.

RESTRICTED AREAS - The airfield has guards and is restricted.

GREEN CARD - An international motor insurance card (commonly referred to as the Green Card) is required when crossing borders of most European countries. POV owners can obtain the Green Card on request at no charge from their insurance company.

INSURANCE - Minimum liability insurance required by German law is DM 1,000,000/1,500,000 for personal injury, DM 400,000 for property damage, and DM 40,000 for consequent damages. Collision and comprehensive insurance are not required by law

but may be desirable to protect the value of your automobile.

BICYCLE - Department of Defense Instruction (DODI) requires persons riding a bicycle on government facilities to wear a safety helmet. This law also applies to passengers. Children under 40 pounds being carried on a bicycle must ride in an approved safety seat.

CHILDREN - Children under the age of nine must be attended at all times even when in your fenced backyard. Only children twelve years of age and over can attend children under the age of nine years. Children under eighteen (18) years of age have a curfew from Sunday through Thursday 2200 hours to 0600 hours and 2300 hours to 0600 hours Friday and Saturday. They must be indoors during these hours.

GAS RATIONING - When you register your vehicle you will be issued your gas rationing papers which is your registration. You must present this paper everytime you purchase gas or gas coupons ON POST. Gasoline on the economy is VERY VERY expensive about \$1.45 a liter.

RATIONING - A ration card is necessary for the purchase of coffee, tea(no herbal) and cigarettes ON POST. You may purchase these items on the economy without any restrictions but there are more expensive.

DOGS - According to Bavarian law the following dogs are ILLEGAL in Bavaria:

- * Pit Bull.
- * Bandog.
- * American Staffordshire Bullterrier.
- * Tosa-Ina.

This includes dogs mixed with any of the above breeds. The burden of proof about what breed you have is on the owner.

The following dogs are assumed to be AGGRESSIVE or DANGEROUS until proven otherwise. These breeds are:

- * Bullmastif * Dog Argentino
- * Fila Brasileiro * Rhodesian Ridgeback
- * Mastin Espanol * Bullterrier
- * Bullterrier * Mastiff
- * Dogue de Bordeaux * Mastino Napoletano

Again, the burden of proof is on the owner. These dogs must be registered immediately upon arrival in Germany. While there is no cost for registering these dogs, the owner will be told at the German Office for Safety and Environment, that the dog will have to be taken to a German veterinarian to be Temperament Tested. There may be a cost for this testing. A dog must be at least three months old in order to be temperament tested. The fine for having an unregistered dog is ... THE SKY'S THE LIMIT! Dogs are registered at the Offentliche Ordnung und Umweltfragen (Office for Safety and Environment). The granting of a permit may be combined with certain requirements such as keeping the dog on a leash and/or use of a muzzle or keeping the animal locked up. Please remember that this is a German office and there may not be anyone who speaks English.

SMOG ALERT - If your vehicle has less than a three (3) way catalitic converter you are not allowed to drive during a Smog Alert. Automobiles with a three way catalytic converter will be issued a sticker at the time of registration.

It is advisable to have a current Stateside driver's license, since a German license cost approximately 3000DM. There is a mandatory orientation class and driver's license testing on Fridays at 0845 BY APPOINTMENT ONLY. This test has 100 written questions on general driving regulations and 50 questions on international road sign recognition. You may borrow a copy of your Drivers Handbook and Examination Manual for Germany at ACS or Driver's Testing in Illesheim. Persons holding an USAREUR POV drivers license and operating a POV are assumed to have given their consent to chemical tests for alcohol or other drug content of the blood, breath, or urine by U.S. authorities.

Registering a privately owned firearm requires: *Proof of ownership. *AE Form 2496 (obtained when you arrive at Storck Barracks). *A \$2.00 check or money order for each weapon. (NO CASH) There is no limit on the number of personally owned firearms that you may bring.

Local Community

Local Community Overview

The village of Illesheim is located three miles southwest of the city of Bad Windsheim. The region in which both Bad Windsheim and Illesheim are located is called Franconia in the state of Bavaria. Although exact dates of the settling of the area are not recorded, 450 AD is generally accepted as being correct. The town of Illesheim is a small German town. It is located about 25 miles northwest from the historic city of Nuernberg, two hours from Frankfurt, three hours from Stuttgart and Munich, six hours from Innsbruck, eight hours from Vienna and about eight hours from Paris. Not only are you in a good location for far reaching travels, but you will find many attractions within a few minutes of Illesheim. Rothenburg, an 800 year old medieval city; Ansbach, site of the summer palace of the Hohenzulerns; Wuerzburg, home of Marienburg Fortress; and Nuernberg, site of the Nuernberg trials following World War II, are all within easy travel distance. This small community serves as a market center for the surrounding agricultural area. It is similar to a small farming community in the midwestern United States, and its people are rugged individualists such as those who are found in the New England states.

You may sense aloofness when walking on the street or in shopping areas as you pass individuals. There is very little greeting to passers-by as you might hear on

your military post or in an American town or small city. People go about their own business. If you feel like it, go ahead and say "Gruss Gott" (the Bavarian greeting). Though they may be unaccustomed to greeting people on the streets, Germans make a point of it when entering shops and small stores. Do the same. When entering a shop say, "Gruss Gott" and, when leaving, "Auf Wiedersehen." You will get a greeting in return.

HANDSHAKES: Handshakes are a way of life in Germany. When a German enters a group of people he may shake everyone's hand. Whatever you do, don't leave the other hand in your pocket if you're shaking hands; it's bad manners. Though German women also shake hands, it's polite, if you are a man, to wait until she stretches her hand out before shaking hands with her.

STARES: Expect to get stared at occasionally. It's not unusual in Germany for people to stare at strangers or people who are dressed differently, colored differently, or talk differently from them, especially in small towns.

MEETING GERMANS: When you begin to meet Germans you'll learn quickly that they do not form their friendships as quickly as Americans. In most cases they have a small group of friends, usually from their childhood or from years in the same neighborhood. They are slow to warm up to strangers like us, who are here two or three years and then leave for an assignment in the States.

HOSTESS GIFTS: It is customary when invited to someone's home to carry a small gift (flowers are appropriate). Note that red roses are reserved for lovers and girlfriends, and white chrysanthemums and asters are traditional for funerals. Just before handing the flowers to your hostess, you should remove the wrapping paper. The visiting male hands the flowers (usually an uneven number) to the lady of the house.

SIE AND DU: Often, within a neighborhood or at work, Germans may be acquainted only on a formal, or "Sie" basis. The "Sie" pronoun, meaning you, is the formal address, while "Du," also meaning you, is the informal or personal. As you study German you'll learn that all your conversations begin on a Sie basis. Later, as you get to know someone well, you may agree mutually to address each other informally as "Du". There's even a ritual called "Bruederschaft trinken" (drink to brotherhood), when two people agree to address each other informally. The exception to the "Sie" formality, and indeed most formalities,

are the younger Germans, who often begin introductions on a "Du" basis.

SINGLE OR MARRIED: In meeting Germans, it is usually easier to determine if females are married than it is to identify the married men. About nine out of ten married women wear their rings on the right hand. Less than half of all married men wear their rings. But you have to be careful, because some women wear wedding rings even though they are not married and some don't wear engagement rings although they are engaged.

LEARNING THE LANGUAGE: The best way to meet Germans is to learn a little of their language. Germans are very helpful and often flattered by someone making an effort to speak their language. The military has an active language program to help servicemembers and their families learn German. Head Start classes are provided to servicemembers during their initial inprocessing schedule and available to family members on a space-available basis.

TRAFFIC: Traffic in Germany is typical of any congested locale. However, driving in Europe requires the operator to be aware of different regulations and rights of way. In the United States, you are accustomed to fitting into tight parking spots. Such shoe-horning is not permitted in Germany, the rule is "no contact!" You will also have to accustom yourself to higher speeds on the highways, known as autobahns. Unless marked, there are no speed limits and traffic moves at sharply varying speeds, therefore you must realize the car coming from far back could be closing in at 180 kilometers/hr (about 105 miles/hr). You may find the typical German driving style to be aggressive and intimidating at first. Observe the defensive driving techniques that you learned in the States and you can help make the European roadways safer for yourself and other drivers as well.

To find out more about the German customs and culture join ACS at their PEP (Newcomers' Orientation). You will learn some basic German, visit some historic German cities, learn how to ride the train and more.

Events Calendar

ACS has a monthly newsletter which lists community events along with local volksmarches and other information. There is a monthly Morale, Welfare and Recreation (MWR) bulletin (Bavarian Bugle) that lists events and activities in the Illesheim/Ansbach Community and a Community Calendar for off-post activities. There are many fairs, festivals and markets which are organized throughout the year by the villages all over Germany. Usually they have carnival rides, a band, and plenty of food and drinks. These local festivals are a great way to meet and interact with Germans. Another way to immerse yourself in the German culture is to join the German/American Kontak Club.

GERMAN/AMERICAN VOLKSMARCHES: This is a very typical part of the German culture. One can stroll at leisure, run, or ride a bicycle through the forests and valleys of the German countryside. They have 10km and 20km paths. A rest stop is provided half way with an area for a picnic and a stall to buy some refreshments and light snacks. You may join the German/American Volksmarching club which offers trips and other activities every month. The club meets every other Monday at a Guest House. For more information call the Katterbach ACS at DSN 467-2846.

GERMAN/AMERICAN FESTS: These fests are held both in the Spring and in the Fall usually on military posts. Vendors are both Germans and Americans with rides and music.

FLEA MARKETS: These markets are held from April through October.

OKTOBERFEST IN MUNICH: This world famous, most extravagant, display of beer drinking and

carnival starts in the middle of September. The parade of various folklore from Europe lasts four hours. The parade started back in 1810 when Crown Prince Ludwig threw a party for all Bavaria to celebrate his marriage to Princess Therese. The fest continues daily at the grounds for three weeks. The Lion (from the Lowenbraueri tent) begins to roar when the first beer keg is tapped and every time a keg is tapped thereafter too.

CHRISTKINDLEMARKT: The highlight of the Advent season is the famous Christkindlesmarkt held in Nuernberg's main market square. Beginning the Friday before Advent and ending Christmas Eve, the market attracts visitors from near and far. At the center of the market is a crib, its wooden figurines telling the Christmas story. At noon and midnight the clock strikes twelve with the help of a Nuernberg Angel, and the three wise men come out to bring their gifts. The market stalls are decorated with branches of fir and lit by lanterns. Christmas decorations, angels, little prune figurines, and the spicy Lebkuchen cakes are for sale.

FASCHING: Fasching starts on the eleventh of November at 11:11. This carnival, similar to the Mardi Gras, goes until Ash Wednesday. Many people dress up and act silly.

Bavaria, the largest of the sixteen states in terms of land area, also has the longest history. As early as the 6th century, Bavarian tribal nobles ruled this region, which has always maintained strong ties to southern Europe and the Donau (Danube) area. The cultural witnesses to this rich history are among the reasons

that make Bavaria the most popular of all German vacation regions.

The capital city of Main-Franconia and a wine-growing center, Wuerzburg has been the spiritual and cultural heart of the region for centuries. The most famous building of Wuerzburg, the Residence, which was built between 1719 and 1744 by Balthasar Neuman, is one of the most significant examples of south German Baroque architecture.

The Romantic Road route, leading from Wuerzburg to Fuessen, guides motorists through many of the tourist attractions of Franconia and Bavaria: from the Baroque splendor of old bishoprics, to small medieval towns, castles, chateaus and churches all filled with invaluable works of art.

As a center of art and science Munich is home to a great many universities, institutes, museums and theaters. The Old and New Pinakothek can pride themselves for having two of Germany's most prominent collections of paintings, and the Deutsches Museum is the most important technology museum in the country.

Rothenburg is about 20 minutes from Illesheim. It is one of the most well-preserved medieval cities in all of Europe. You can feel the spirit of times past by walking for a mile and a half atop the city wall or by looking down on the clustered town roofs.

Nuernberg is about 45 minutes from Illesheim. Here you will find a large metropolitan area with a lot to offer. The Opera House, Nuernberg castle, the Train Museum, the Planetarium, Hand Man Tower and the remaining buildings from Hitler's years and shopping in the Old City will keep you busy for many days. This once badly bombed city, a symbol of German glory for over 1000 years and for a short span, of German shame, has been meticulously restored.

Ansbach has a historical city center, with the Margrave's Palace located at the heart. Across from the palace you will find the Orangerie and Park, one of the most remarkable park palaces of Franconia.

At the PEP (Newcomers' Orientation) you will learn about some great places to visit, how to travel through Europe in a budget and where to get some great information for your travels. ACS also has many brochures of amusement parks and historical villages for free.

Recreation Opportunities

There is plenty to see and do around Illesheim not to mention the rest of Germany and Europe. There are museums, amusement parks and zoos to visit. Outdoor activities such as hiking and biking are popular. Winter sports such as skiing, sledding, snowboarding, and ice skating are also available. Summer sports include rafting, mountain climbing and hiking. The best way to experience Germany is to get out and see it. There are clubs which include both Germans and Americans. They are the Ski Club, the KONTACT Club, Volksmarching Club and the German/American Ladies Friendship Group. ACS has FREE brochures on different locations throughout Europe

LOCAL RECREATION OPTIONS:

- * Lake Oberzenn is about 4 miles from Illesheim and offers swimming, fishing, sailing and windsurfing.
- * Hoheneck Nature Park runs along the ridge of the valley that surrounds Illesheim. Trails for walking go on for miles.
- * Volksmarching is an organized walk through the countryside, and is a favorite pastime in Germany. The Stars and Stripes Newspaper most of the area volksmarches every Thursday. You may also pick up some brochures of upcoming volksmarches at ACS.
- * There are a number of indoor/outdoor swimming pools within a short driving distance of Illesheim.
- * Horseback riding is offered through stables in Bad Windsheim.
- * In the winter Bad Windsheim offers an outdoor Ice Skating Rink and Burgbernheim offers a very small ski/toboggan hill when snowfall is sufficient.
- * There are over 2000 camping sites in Germany, some of which are open even in winter. Camping facilities are usually highly organized with small shops, bath houses, and recreation areas for children.
- * Amusement parks similar to those in the US are very popular and abundant in Germany. The most well-known are Phantasialand, Holiday Park, Europa Park, Geiselwind and the most recent Warner Brothers.
- * There are many animal parks and zoological gardens. Some great zoos to visit are located in

Nuernberg, Frankfurt and a wildpark in Bad Mergentheim.

* There are over 100 well-marked bicycle routes throughout the region. Hotels and restaurants along these routes are geared to bicyclists. Many trains will also carry bicycles to the starting point of a bicycle tour or you may rent a bicycle in some of the towns.

* Many small rivers and canals are ideal for canoeing. The German Canoeing Organization has published a canoeing guide which describes all suitable water routes.

* Downhill and cross-county skiing is available at AFRC in Garmish and Chiemsee, popular ski resorts with the military. These spots are situated close to the Swiss and Austrian Alps.

Armed Forces Recreation Centers (AFRC) are located in Southern Bavaria amidst the Alps. One is located in Chiemsee and the other in Garmish. They offer a variety of sports in several areas, tours, rental equipment and lessons for almost every sport and interest. All AFRC facilities are within 4 hours driving distance of Illesheim. They both have camping areas and hotel. The rates are from \$55.00 to \$66.00 per night depending on occupancy and rank of servicemember. AFRC also has mountain climbing, hiking, sailing, windsurfing, rafting, scuba diving, hand gliding, paragliding and more. There are many things to do at these incredible locations.

Shopping

Shopping in Germany is a little different than in the states. Germans generally shop more frequently than we do and purchase smaller quantities. Most shops are small and specialized, but there are some which compare to our large department and grocery stores. It is best to bring along a shopping bag or basket since some stores do not provide them or they charge you a small fee for them.

Bad Windsheim (located about 2 miles away) has just about every kind of merchandise you could want. Ansbach is about a 20 minute drive and has a great downtown shopping area and an indoor shopping mall. Within a 2 hour drive are the downtown shopping areas of Wuerzburg, Frankfurt, Munich, and Nuernberg. Thursday is a late shopping day when

the major cities and stores typically stay open until 2000.

Ansbach has a wonderful downtown shopping area which includes a new shopping center. The Bruecken Center has over 80 vendors and parking for 1850 cars. Numerous cafes and fast food establishments beckon to hungry shoppers. The center is open Monday through Friday 0900-2000 and Saturdays 0900-1600. the center is closed on Sundays.

In the city centers there is usually a pedestrian zone where specialty shops and large department stores are located. These zones attract street musicians, sidewalk cafes and restaurants for relaxing after shopping.

Farmers' markets are open from morning until noon. Bad Windsheim's farmers' market is on Thursday. Ansbach is open on Wednesday and Saturday. There you can buy fresh fruits, meats, vegetables, cheeses and flowers.

Only a short drive away are other shopping opportunities. The Kaiser Porcelain Factory is located near Bamberg. There are crystal factories and a nutcracker factory near Grafenwoehr in Neustadt a.d. Waldnaab. Trips to the Czech Republic are also popular. There you can buy crystal and porcelain inexpensively. All of these factories are open for a few hours on Saturday mornings. Polish pottery is very popular with Americans and you will see bus trips going there all the time.

State and Community Social Service Agencies

Comments: Civilian Counseling Services are provided to increase the effectiveness of the civilian work force.

Non-Profit Social Service Agencies

WIC is not provided here in Europe. ACS does provide a program called TIME (Toddlers, Infants and Mothers Education) for soldiers E-4 and below with children 3 years and younger. This program provides formula and diapers with a once a month meeting. To find out if you qualify for this program stop by ACS and fill out an application.

Community Transportation

There are a number of ways to get around Germany. Almost all German cities are well supplied with buses and streetcars. They generally run frequently and punctually, and they provide excellent transportation. You buy your tickets at train stations, at special kiosks, at vending machines, or less frequently on the buses and streetcars themselves. A single ticket usually runs from 2 to 4 DM and is normally cheaper if you buy it at one of the kiosks or vending machines.

You will find taxis lined up at train stations, airports and busy city intersections. Most cab drivers speak English, so you merely need to state your destination and hop in. The cab driver will lower the "flag" on the meter and the price of your fare will begin ticking. Don't be alarmed if the price starts out as high as 5 or 10DM. That's the minimum fare the taxi charges. Your fare will be added on top of that.

The trains of the German Railway (German Bundesbahn) are fast, punctual, clean, comfortable and safe. Long distance trains have good diners and sleepers. In the stations (Bahnhof) one will find the yellow schedule "ABFAHRT" for trains leaving and the white schedule "ANKUNFT" for trains arriving. You may buy your ticket at the train station, in advance at Carlson Wagonlit, or on board the train (but you will pay extra.)

U-bahns and S-bahns are simple Germany's subways. U-bahns run mostly underground, S-bahns mostly above ground. Both operate in large cities and are

generally clean, modern, and efficient. They work pretty much like streetcars. You buy your ticket at a kiosk or vending machine and you validate it in a small time clock when you climb aboard.

There is a regular bus and train service from Illesheim to Bad Windsheim. The schedule is posted at ACS and at the bus and train stops. It costs 2.80 DM for either the train or bus into Bad Windsheim. Bring exact or small change. For the bus you pay the bus driver. For the train you purchase a ticket at the window in the train station or the vending machine. Traveling around Europe is as easy as jumping into your car, boarding a train, or hailing a taxi. European highways are excellent, train connections are great, and city transportation is first-rate.

To become familiar with the train system join ACS in their train familiarization program. Every month they will take you on a train ride to a German city where you will learn how to purchase a train ticket, read the train schedule and at the same time tour a lovely German city.

The Illesheim military community offers a wide range of educational programs. There is an Elementary/Middle School, a High School located in Ansbach, City College of Chicago, Embry Riddle Aeronautical University, University of Oklahoma and University of Maryland.

Our Elementary/Middle School and High School are part of the Department of Defense Dependents School (DoDDS) which is part of the Department of Defense Educational Activity (DoDEA). It is a public school serving the children of American Army units. Our schools are certified by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools.

The school serves an AAFES hot lunch from the cafeteria line. Lunch tickets are available at the PX. Some families may be eligible for a free or reduced price lunch program. The eligibility forms are available at the school office. Once the form is completed, take it with a copy of the most recent LES to Community where eligibility is determined. Students may also pay cash. The price of a hot lunch

is \$1.95 for grades 1-6 and \$2.10 for grades 7-12. PRICES ARE SUBJECT TO CHANGE.

There is a free bus to take children that live on the economy to the Elementary/Middle School. Students in grades 7 - 12 are bused to the Ansbach American Middle/High School located south of Illesheim on Katterbach Kaserne. The rides takes approximately 30-40 minutes. In addition to the regular bus that returns after school, there is an activities bus for Hight School students that returns later for students involved in sports and other after school activities. There are after school activities for the elementary/middle school between 1430 - 1600 but no bus service is provided.

The school is equipped with IBM computers in each middle school room and Apple computers in each elementary room. There are 8 IBM compatible computers in the library through which students can explore the world of CD-Rom and search the card catalog. In addition, the school has an Apple computer lab and two IBM computer labs.</p> <p>Students should arrive at 0755. The tardy bell rings at 0800. The teacher will tell them which doors they are to use. Please note there is no supervision before 0745 and children must wait outside. Study trips are an important dimension of the school program. Students are expected to complete assignments given on the study trip. Parents are encouraged to chaperon on these trips. DoDDS suggests that there should be one chaperon for every eight students.</p> <p>Currently a partial German language immersion program is being offered to second and third graders at the Illesheim School. The German Immersion class provides our students the unique opportunity to learn the host nation language. The program enables students to learn through direct instruction in the German language while meeting the DoDDS curriculum for the grade level. The students are taught the following subjects in German: Math, Social Studies, Health, and Science. Language Arts and Reading area taught in English, as in a regular classroom. The program allows your child to learn a second language similarly to how the first language was learned. By the end of the first year, the</p>

students are communicating in simple sentences. At the end of the second year, the students are able to converse in, read, and write in the German language.

Additional Curricular Programs: The school has a number of "extra" programs. The activities offered each year depend upon the funding that is available. Some programs are supported by the PTSA and include national competition in the following areas:

Special Education

The preschool/handicapped program is specifically designed for children ages three to five, with developmental delays. A child must have a 25% delay in one area or a 20% delay in two of the following areas: social/emotional development, adaptive/self-development, cognitive development, communication development, or physical development. The 1/2 day program is designed to get the child ready for kindergarten and first grade by working on individualized goals. To qualify for the program, the child must be referred by the Exceptional Family Member Program or attend a Child Find screening.

Communication-impaired students are served by an itinerant speech-language pathologist during school hours. Speech therapy is provided and includes the remediation of misarticulation and dysfluency, as well as disorders of voice, rate, pitch, volume, and intensity. Language therapy comprises the development of correct language form, content and use, as well as the improvement of listening skills and the ability to process information that is received orally.

While in Europe you are not able to collect unemployment benefits.

Family members are encouraged to use the Army Community Service Center's Employment Assistance Programs to create or update an existing resume or Federal Job Application. Without a professionally

prepared application, obtaining employment at Illesheim, Katterbach or Ansbach will be difficult. The USAREUR Resume (RESUMIX) is now the only application accepted in Europe. The SF171 is accepted for DoDDs positions only. The local job market is extremely competitive.

Job-seeking spouses should handcarry important documents such as their last SF-50 (if Federal Civil Service), LWOP statement, DD Form 214 (if former military), College Transcripts etc.

Employment opportunities for Non-EU nationals, ie Korean, Mexican, Canadian etc., are limited due to the Status of Forces Agreement. Check with the Civilian Personnel Office and AAFES Human Resources Office for the current employment restrictions. Non-US citizens apply through the Local National Office.

Family Members can submit their resume to USAREUR's database prior to arrival in country. The self-nomination process for actual vacancies or for open continuous announcements should not be started until you are in country. You should download the Resumix Resume Job Kit from the website prior to submission of the resume. Any deviation from the procedures outlined in the job kit may cause the resume to be rejected.

The Civilian Personnel Office in Ansbach and the Illesheim ACS advertise positions weekly. Many of the jobs advertised at Illesheim are open only to military spouses of active duty and civilian employee family members.

A civilian spouse of an active duty military member will be given preference for initial employment in the same commuting area as the new duty station of the sponsor. Marriage must have taken place prior to the sponsor's PCS. The spouse has not accepted/declined a Federal or Non-Appropriate Fund (NAF or AAFES) job expected to last one year or more in the commuting area of the new duty station of the sponsor. Military Spouse Preference(MSP) will be lost when you accept or decline an offer of continuing employment. This includes positions with Non-Appropriated Fund (NAF) and AAFES. Continuing employment is employment to a position expected to last one year or more. MSP will also be lost if your current temporary position is extended to last one year or longer. The loss of MSP will be for the duration of your military spouse's tour. You may continue to pursue employment, however, you will be referred as a family member without preference.

Most appropriated fund (AF) jobs are full-time, and professional (white collar) or manual (blue collar) in nature. Non-appropriated fund (NAF) jobs and jobs with AAFES tend to be part-time and service oriented. Full-time professional positions only open occasionally. Contract positions are few and far between, but they do exist at the Education Center, and through local contractors.

Temporary Employment Resources

A large part of the jobs available at Illesheim are of a temporary nature. "Intermittent part time", and "temporary not to exceed..." type positions are constantly being advertised. Non-Paid or Volunteer Opportunities

Volunteering is a valuable way to obtain experience and make contacts necessary for seeking a position you are interested in. Administrative and clerical jobs are available in many locations on base. These positions are located in offices such as Legal, Housing Management Office, Units the Library and more.

The Installation Volunteer Coordinator (IVC) oversees the role of volunteer in the community, brings together potential volunteers and agencies that need their services, and encourages cooperation and support of all volunteer referrals and information point of contact. The IVC ensures that all volunteers in the community are recognized and rewarded for their services. Some locations that volunteers are needed are:

- * The American Red Cross accepts and trains volunteers as case workers, office assistants and instructors in Health and Safety.

- * The clinic needs volunteers in administration, patient assistance, Health Promotions, and many other areas.

Private Sector Employment

There is very little private sector employment (off post). A number of American and German firms in Germany hire U.S. family members. Most positions require fluency in the German language. There are a few video rental places and car insurance places that hire Americans off post but these positions are few in number. In your search for employment you might want to pay a visit to your local Arbeitsamt. The Arbeitsamt is equivalent to a state employment office. It has the following categories for people seeking employment:

- * German Citizens.

- * Members of European Common Market Countries.

- * Family Members of U.S. Military Personnel or NATO.

You will be required to fill out an application for employment. All forms are in German so we recommend that you take a German/English Dictionary with you (not all offices have English speaking personnel). Other things to take with you are:

- * Valid passport with Status of Forces Agreement (SOFA) stamp in it.
- * Diplomas from any college, secretarial or trade school you have attended.
- * List of former employers with names and addresses.

Family members of the U.S. military are not required to obtain work permits for employment on the local economy.

In order to operate a HOME-BASED BUSINESS in military housing, applicant must submit a business proposal stating what services will be offered, supplies needed and where purchased, and estimated costs of services provided. Home based businesses involving the sale of commercial items, such as Tupperware, Mary Kay, Avon etc., ARE PROHIBITED. Applications and copies of the policy letter can be obtained at ACS.

NOTE: German custom requirements and compliance with international agreements can impose significant restriction on home-based business, especially those dealing with a product. There are restrictions on using our quarters and the Military Postal system. Checking with ACS first is strongly recommended.

Government Employment

Appropriated and non-appropriated fund jobs are few due to the military downsizing however, a few job openings do become available each week. A new job announcement list is published each Monday morning. For a listing of job vacancies stop by the CPO, or ACS to obtain specific job information.

Networking Opportunities

Networking opportunities are limited to the base and maybe other bases in Europe unless you can hook into the Internet. There are a number of professional organizations with European branches that are an excellent vehicle for networking. Learning German might open international networking opportunities for you. Contact your family member employment specialist at ACS for networking opportunities within the Illesheim community.

Medical And Dental

Medical and Dental Overview

The military community in Illesheim has a medical dispensary and dental clinic but no hospital. The Dispensary is able to provide for basic medical needs, but it is not a 24 hour facility. A German hospital is located within five minutes of Storck Barracks for emergency care. The closest American hospital is in Wuerzburg, about 45 minutes to an hour away.

In the event of serious illness or injury during non-duty hours (after 1630 weekdays, weekends and holidays) you would observe the following procedures: If you have transportation, proceed to the ER in Wuerzburg Hospital about 32 miles away or the Bad Windsheim Krankenhaus about 2 miles away. Your first choice for emergency treatment if possible should be a U.S. Army facility like the Wuerzburg Hospital. For seriously ill patients, direct admission into the Krankenhaus may be required.

Sick Call appointments are made in the morning for the same day with military personnel receiving priority. There is normally a waiting list for

Optometry, OB, GYN, and follow-up appointments. Immunizations and Wart Clinics are done on a walk-in basis. The Dispensary has a Pharmacy.

Referrals are made to doctors on the economy (off post) or to the Wuerzburg Army Hospital. A TRICARE representative is located at the Dispensary and the Patient Liason is available to attend appointments with doctors on the economy. Childbirth facilities are available at both the Wuerzburg Military Hospital and the Bad Windsheim Krankenhaus.

Health Benefits Advisor, Wellness, and CHAMPUS/TRICARE Programs

TRICARE EUROPE pays for eligible active duty and family member beneficiaries the cost of medical care received from civilian physicians, hospitals and other medical providers, when care is not available in the Military Treatment Facility. Generally speaking, TRICARE will cover most services and supplies required for diagnosis and treatment of any illness or injury, including maternity care provided that the care is medically necessary, the care is rendered at

the appropriate level and the services provided in accordance with sound medical practice and established quality standards by physicians or other authorized professional providers. Prior to receiving care on the economy check with the Health Benefits Advisor. The Health Benefits Advisor is a key person to help locate quality civilian health care. The Health Benefits Advisor can explain your medical entitlements.

Community Hospitals

Standards of privacy do vary between American and German medical facilities. German physicians may not always use a chaperon when examining patients of the opposite sex. The German physician may ask a patient to undress, while ancillary staff may be passing through the area. It is important to note that their standard of practice is, to them, just as proper as the U.S. standard is to Americans. The length of hospitalization is likely to be longer in the German facilities. For example, remaining in the hospital six to eight days after a C-section or three-four days after vaginal birth is not unusual.

Comments: It is used during emergencies. From post go out the main gate and turn to the left. Follow the priority road until you come to a "T" intersection. Turn right on 470. Go past the first turn off to Bad Windsheim and turn left toward Bad Windsheim at the second "exit." Follow the priority road until you see an ESSO station and the right turn 25 meters prior to the ESSO station. Remain on the priority road through three 90' curves. Immediately after the third curve, take the first right. After crossing rail road tracks (approximately 200 meters) take the road to the left. Follow that road (Erkenbrecht) until the last building on the left. ACS and the Dispensary have maps to the different hospitals.

* **SICK CALL / EMERGENCIES:** Sick call is at 0730-0830 Mon-Fri. On call responsibilities for dental emergencies is shared with the Ansbach Dental Clinic. This means that after hours emergency patients will frequently be required to travel to the Ansbach/Katterbach Dental Clinic.

* **DENTAL APPOINTMENT** Call the clinic during duty hours Mon-Fri to schedule EXAM appointments. Exam appointments are normally done on an annual basis.

Appointments for fillings, oral surgery, etc. are normally given at the exam appointment and/or at the conclusion of a regular scheduled appointment. Occasionally it is necessary to give appointments over the phone, but please don't ask for an appointment for fillings over the phone unless you have already had a dental exam (check-up) within the last 12 months in OUR CLINIC.

Hygiene (cleaning) appointments are given on an annual basis.

A short call list is maintained at the reception desk with the names and phone numbers of patients who can come in on short notice if we have cancellations. This is available to everyone who can report to the clinic within 5-10 minutes of being called. If you are interested in being included on the list, please let the receptionist know.

Dental services are available at the Dental Clinic. For specialty dental care you may be referred to other dental facilities. Currently, there is a long waiting period for orthodontic care. You might want to have all orthodontic work done prior to leaving the states.

Family Member Dental Plan

* **PRIORITY OF CARE:** As in all military dental clinics, active duty service members have priority for dental care. Treatment for all non-active duty individuals is on a space available basis.

* **DENTAL TREATMENT FOR CHILDREN AND TEENAGERS:** We encourage you to bring your child for his/her first dental exam at about age of two. Sometimes we don't accomplish very much, but just getting them accustomed to seeing the dental clinic will help them later when they actually need dental care.

Parents must accompany any child under the age of 18 for their initial examination and children under the age of 15 must have their parent accompany them for all treatment. If the child is between 15 and 18 years of age, he or she may have routine treatment (does not include any oral surgical procedures) without the parent present.

We welcome children in our clinic if they are going to be seen. No children under the age of 13 are allowed in the reception area unless they are here to seek dental treatment.

The Illesheim Housing Referral Office must approve all housing and negotiate all contracts for servicemembers to receive their Overseas Housing Allowance (OHA). Apartments and townhomes/single family dwellings are available; however, mobile homes are not.

Economy (off post) housing is handled by the Housing Referral Office on Storck Barracks which has an inventory of units that fluctuates as new personnel/units arrive and depart the community. All U.S. personnel, both military and civilian, who wish to live off post must process through the Housing Referral Office.

Government (on post) housing is available. There are no waiting lists for most categories. Temporary quarters are available, there are no waiting lists for these also. Temporary quarters allow servicemembers to receive housing until permanent quarters become available. This allows the servicemembers the option of concurrent travel or shortened separation time.

When you arrive at Illesheim you might be living in temporary quarters until you occupy permanent housing. You will not receive Temporary Lodging Allowance (TLA) while living in temporary quarters.

Members will be assigned to a unit in accordance with their bedroom entitlement, generally a bedroom for the member and spouse and a bedroom for each child. Pay grades E7-E9 and O4-O5 are entitled to a minimum of 3 bedrooms. Grades O6 and above are entitled to 4 bedrooms minimum. Positions on the waiting list will be determined by the detachment

date from your previous duty station depending on eligibility criteria upon arrival.

Government-controlled family housing is handled by the Assignment and Termination Office. There are 391 permanent and 90 temporary quarters available in Illesheim. Most on-post housing are apartments in the stairwell situation. Stairwell members share the responsibility of cleaning common areas. On-post government housing has 220/110 voltage outlets in the kitchen and bathrooms. All other outlets are 110 volts. Off-post housing only has 220 voltage outlets.

The availability of rental housing is determined by date of application, regardless of rank. If you have a sponsor, request he/she place your name on the off post housing list ASAP. A letter signed by the unit CDR with your name, date of arrival and number of members in your family is required.

Community Housing

All housing contracts must be accomplished through the Housing Management Office.

For civilians and DoDD employees:

When you find an economy housing unit that you want to rent, you should complete a Letter of Intent to Rent Economy Housing. This is done only after the unit, rent, and fees if applicable have been reviewed by a Housing Management Office representative. Landlords can ask up to three months rent as a security deposit. You start paying rent on the date the quarters are available. The Letter of Intent to Rent Economy Housing is a legally enforceable document. Because you are on official US Government orders and therefore have a special entry status into Germany under the Status of Forces Agreement (SOFA), purchase of a house is extremely complicated. Marriage to a German citizen makes it a little less complicated, but it is always very expensive.

Utilities

The German phone system is very expensive. It is recommended that one has a calling card before arriving in Germany.

The Bundespost, or German Post Office is a convenient place to have your phone connected, pay your telephone bill and place local and long distance telephone calls. If you live in economy housing where a telephone has never been installed, your landlord must sign your application and you may be required to make a deposit in addition to the installation fee. You must know your residential address, not unit address. If possible, you and the previous tenant should go to the Bundespost together and make the transfer to your name. Thus, you can ensure that the previous tenant has paid his/her final bill. After you request a phone, you will receive a green form in the mail, listing your new number and confirming your request. Installation usually will be attempted the next working day. If you are not home when the company tries to install the phone; go back to the Bundespost to have a date and time arranged.

The cost of the installation of a phone is minimum of 100 DM depending on whether phone service has been available in your home before or if you have

more than one phone installed. This charge is included in your first bill. All calls, even to your neighbor across the street, are charged. You will not receive an itemized bill unless you request it at the Bundespost and pay a one time fee. The payment of your bill is due within seven days of the mailing date (absendetag) printed on the bill. Your bill can also be paid directly from your local bank account. Check with your bank and Bundespost to receive the required forms.

You are able to use your American phone with an adaptor that can be purchased inexpensively at the Four Seasons. You are also able to use your answering machine when plugged to a transformer if it is not dual voltage.

For persons living on the economy, payment of utilities will be handled in various manners: a) Included in rent (rental contract will state so): Caution must be exercised as some landlords may periodically state that rent must be raised due to an increase of utilities or because the tenant is using "more than normal" amounts. If the latter is the case, the tenant has the right to request "proof" of such. If the landlord does not have such "proof"; (e.g. meter readings) the tenant should consult the local HRO for advice. b) Paid by landlord and tenant receives a monthly (separate) bill: Again tenant should be furnished proof of usage. (Water bills may be calculated monthly, semi-annually or annually depending on specific area of residence. Trash and sewage bills are normally paid annually). c) Tenant receives and pays all bills.

Recycling is not only encouraged but mandatory here. You must separate glass, clean paper, metal, batteries or solvents (hazardous waste), and all others. Recycling containers are usually found in every town and in various locations on post. Heavy fine (up to 500 DM) will be imposed if you do not recycle.

*The following only applies to those people living off post who have to pay their own utilities.

Electricity bills are figured on an average annual usage factor and paid in monthly installments with 31 December being the annual cut-off date. The electric company calculates the average use through experience with previous customers and based on the size of the residence. Each monthly electricity bill will normally be the same throughout the year. On 31 December, the actual usage will be tabulated and the customer will either receive a refund credit towards future bills because of lower than anticipated usage

or a drop in cost of service. An additional bill might be received because of more than anticipated usage or an increase in cost of service. The monthly bills beginning on 1 January will be based upon the previous year's usage.

Monthly electricity bills may be increased during a calendar year if: a) a significant rise in cost of electricity occurs or b) if the customer is using a significantly higher amount of electricity than previously anticipated. In either case the customer will be notified in writing.

Electricity is expensive in Germany and care must be exercised if one wishes to avoid high bills.

The cost of oil fluctuates between 45-70 pfennings per liter without tax, depending on seasonal pricing. In some cases, this is included in one's rent. If the residence is serviced by a community/joint use oil tank a customer may have to pay a percentage of the cost of oil which is based upon the size of the living area, unless individual meters are provided. Heating oil is expensive, but you may be able to trim costs by purchasing it yourself (check with your landlord first).

Depending on the area in which you reside, you will be billed for water and sewage on a monthly, semi-annual, or annual basis. These services are not expensive, but you should be provided with a bill reflecting meter readings for water use. If your sewage system is clogged you or your landlord must call a plumber to correct the situation. You may be expected to pay all or a portion of the bill if you were at fault because of neglect. If this situation arises, you should consult with your HRO.

CAUTION should be exercised when using commercial drain cleaners as some of the products available through the US facilities may damage rather than help the sewer/drain systems in older residences. Check with your landlord first.

Relocation Assistance

Army Community Service's Relocation Assistance Program provides current information, services, and education concerning relocation.

Our Mini-PEP is a one day brief orientation to the services and programs we have at ACS. We give you an inside view of travel information and recreation programs in your community. We offer this program every second Wednesday of the month.

The ACS Loan Closet provides loaner items such as baby cribs, high chairs, car seats, pots and pans, strollers, dishes, flatware and small appliances on a temporary basis to assist families in setting up housekeeping until their personal household goods arrive.

In our center you can find FREE travel information not only to areas in Germany but throughout Europe. We have a Daytrip Guide that will get you started in finding places to go and visit within a 2 hour radius.

In Transit Emergencies

No matter how well you plan, emergencies happen. Carry important papers with you, not packed in your luggage or your household goods. Write down telephone numbers for your sponsor, unit, orderly room and the command post at your gaining unit.

The USO at the airports, American Red Cross and the Army Emergency Relief are available for emergency aid. Red Cross phone numbers are usually listed in the white pages of the local telephone directory. They can help with emergency financial assistance and

contacting people that will need to know where you are and what's happening. The Army Emergency Relief(AER) can be reached by contacting Army Community Service on any Army installation. On other military installations, contact Red Cross. All the military services and American Red Cross have reciprocal agreements with the AER to help people in emergency situations.

Financial Preparedness

The Army Community Services is the point of contact for the Consumer Affairs and Assistance Program(CAFAP). This program emphasizes personal financial responsibility and accountability by providing basic principles and practices of sound money management, counseling tools and referral services. The CAFAP Manager is trained to assist soldiers and family members. Contact ACS for an appointment.

Financial guidance is offered to those experiencing money management difficulties or for those who wish to be in control of their finances. The ACS CAFAP Manager can work with you to prepare a personalized budget and spending plan. Information and assistance is also available in areas such as military pay and allowances, consumer rip-offs, savings, insurance, car buying, credit card management and much more.

Any reassignment is expensive, especially for those living off post. It sometimes takes awhile for pay and/or entitlements to take effect. Always have some savings set aside for emergencies and plan for the unexpected.

Household Goods In-Bound Shipments

Shipment of your household goods takes from 2 to 2 1/2 months to reach Germany. Government furniture can be loaned to you until you receive your household goods. Items such as baby car seats, playpens, cribs, high chairs and children booster seats can be loaned out through ACS. Other items available at your ACS office are cooking utensils, pots and pans, electrical appliances and more. When you in-process call the Transportation Office for a timetable of when to expect your household goods.

Household Goods Out-Bound Shipments

Arrangement for your household goods shipment begins at your Transportation Office. Each pay grade has its own weight allowance, which is the maximum weight that can be moved at government expense. The allowance includes the weight of your household goods shipped, placed in storage or sent as unaccompanied baggage. Anything exceeding the

maximum weight allowance must be paid by the service member.

Unaccompanied Baggage: consists of items you will need immediately upon arrival at your new duty station. This shipment is packed and shipped by air separately from your household goods.

Household Goods: contains major household belongings. This shipment is transported to the US by boat and can take up to eighty days to receive. Call your Transportation Office for a timetable of when you can expect the arrival of your household goods. Then plan your shipment accordingly.

Household Goods Claims

Have your copy of the Household Goods Inventory paperwork on hand to ensure all boxes are present. Count the boxes and verify their condition. Check inventory numbers with numbers on boxes. If the boxes show exterior damage, they should be unpacked and examined for damage in the presence of the carrier.

VERY IMPORTANT * Open boxes containing high-value items in the presence of the carrier. The contents should be inventoried before the carrier is released.

The carrier must reassemble furniture if they disassembled it at the other end and you want them to reassemble it. The carrier is required to unpack all boxes if you want them to. They are also required to remove packing material. Annotate any and all damage on DD Form 1840 at delivery.

EACH shipment is insured by the government up to \$40,000. If something is damaged during shipment, you must SAVE that item to claim it. List all items you discovered to be damaged or missing after delivery on your DD1840R. Turn in your paperwork to your Claims Office within 70 days of receipt of your goods.

POV In-Bound Shipments

After arrival in Germany, contact the Transportation Office so the appropriate paperwork can be completed and arrangements made to receive your POV. You should bring a copy of your DD Form 788 (POV inspection Form), and a full set of orders including any amendments and pin-point assignment to the Inbound Transportation Office. You will be notified by the Transportation staff when your vehicle has arrived at the vehicle processing point, located in Schweinfurt (about 1 1/2 hours north of Ansbach). Obtain temporary license plates and temporary registration from Vehicle Registration prior to picking up your POV.

For your registration you will need:

- a) stateside registration or proof of ownership
- b) DD Form 788 (Shipping documents)
- c) USAREUR Driver's License
- d) Double white insurance card or insurance policy
- e) Two copies of AE Form 190-1A (USAREUR POV Registration/Title Certificate)
- f) \$10.00 check or money order (CASH IS NOT ACCEPTED)

Individuals will be issued license plates and a registration certificate valid for five days, in order to complete the initial inspection.

Picking up your POV: Report to the Contractor's Office first. Have with you DD Form 788 and ID card. At this time a joint inspection of your POV will be conducted with the TMP site personnel. Results will be annotated on the DD Form 788. In case of a claim for damages, visit the Claims office.

POVs must be picked up within 14 working days of notification. After 14 days, a memorandum from the owner, endorsed by the commander may be submitted to waive time limitation, if circumstances exist (i.e. field duty, TDY, hospitalization etc.) Route through local Transportation Office for approval.

IMMEDIATELY after receiving the vehicle from the contracting agent, the customer will proceed to the POV inspection point.

The following items are required for inspection:

- a) AE Form 190-1A, Vehicle Registration
- b) A warning triangle
- c) An approved first aid kit

If the vehicle passes the inspection, the individual will return to the vehicle registration office that issued the temporary registration and provide the inspection certification. The registration station will

issue the customer permanent registration certificate valid for one year.

If the vehicle fails inspection, the individual has until close of business on the fifth working day to complete the mechanical inspection or register the vehicle nonoperational. If the individual can prove the vehicle is in a repair facility, vehicle registration personnel may grant an extension of five days. If the vehicle does not pass the inspection during the additional five day period, the individual must park the vehicle in an authorized area and apply for a nonoperational registration.

A Power of Attorney will be needed if someone other than the owner picks up the vehicle.

POV Out-Bound Shipments

You are allowed to ship one POV at government expense. During your Transportation appointment, you will be given all the paperwork for your POV turn-in. When preparing to turn in your POV, make sure your vehicle is in good physical and mechanical condition, clean inside and out, and the undercarriage is free of dirt that could provide nesting places for insects. The radiator should contain adequate anti-freeze to protect the car while in transit. Also remember to remove cassette tapes, cd's etc. A complete set of keys must accompany the vehicle.

Foreign made POVs cannot be shipped at military expense to CONUS unless the vehicle has proof it was shipped to USAREUR from CONUS.

All incoming officer/enlisted personnel must inprocess through 64th Replacement in Rhein Main AB, Frankfurt even if they have a pin-point assignment. Changes can occur in your assignment. Personnel will then be transported by bus to their gaining post. Service members will need 3 copies of orders, 201 file, and leave form. A checklist will be issued with inprocessing instruction. Service members must report in duty uniform. A member from the unit assigned will pick-up the service member and transport them to their unit.

All incoming personnel will report to the Housing Office for housing arrangements.

You must register your pet within 2 weeks of your arrival in Germany. You may register at the monthly pet clinic located once a month at ACS. The Wuerzburg Veterinarian Clinic comes to Illesheim on a monthly basis for vaccinations, registrations and nail clippings.

Billeting

Storck Barracks does not have billeting facilities. We do offer temporary quarters for military families who are inprocessing; these facilities are only for families. Single soldiers E1-E6 will be assigned to the barracks, E7 - officers will stay at a guesthouse or BOQ. Civilians need to make arrangements with a guesthouse. (See the Record Listing for local Guesthouses). All incoming personnel need to report to the Housing Office for on- or off-post housing with the exception of single soldiers assigned to the barracks.

If you arrive on the weekend or after duty hours make sure you notify your sponsor so they can make prior arrangements. If your sponsor can not make these arrangements you need to stay at a Guesthouse off post until the next duty day. Information is available at the Family Housing Office about temporary housing in the immediate area. Temporary Lodging Allowance (TLA) may be authorized to partially reimburse soldiers for the more than normal expenses incurred after arrival at their permanent duty station while staying in hotel like accommodations and for expenses as a result of use of temporary lodging without adequate facilities for meal preparation and consumption. TLA is not authorized while staying with a friend or relatives in a private home except for meals charged by the host. Soldiers will be briefed soon after arrival on procedures to apply for TLA. Some conditions that must be met that you need to know about are: you must occupy temporary lodging, receipt is required for lodging (receipts are not required for meals, etc. as this is paid on a flat percentage rate) and actual expense records are the primary basis for determining the amount of TLA you are paid. Without an accurate record of expenses, your entitlements to TLA may be jeopardized. Be sure to keep your receipts and a list of expenses. A small book for this purpose might help. The maximum time period for payment of TLA is 60 days. Local hotel rates run from 75.00 DM per night and usually include a continental type (German style) breakfast. Bad

Windsheim, located approximately 2 miles away, has a variety of hotels, pensions and guesthouses to choose from with transportation to post available by bus, taxi or train at reasonable rates.

Students in grades 7-12 are bused to the Ansbach American MIDDLE/HIGH SCHOOL located south of Illesheim on Katterbach Kaserne. The ride takes approximately 30-40 minutes. The school bus leaves

from the housing area next to the Fort Apache Club. In addition to the regular bus that returns after school, there is an activities bus that returns later for students involved in sports and other after school activities. You will find the normal required courses such as English, Math, Social Studies, and Physical Ed. along with exciting elective classes. Your electives include: Art, Band, Chorus, Coop Work Experience, German I, II, III, and IV, Intro to Psychology, Home Economics, Journalism, JROTC, Media Skills, Spanish I, II, III, and IV, Street Law, Yearbook. Some sports that you can join in are: Basketball, Cross Country, Football, Golf, Soccer, Tennis, Track and Field, Volleyball and Wrestling.

Host Nation experiences are an important part of the high school experience and we have some programs that are unique to Germany. The Renaissance Program is a school and community sponsored program which gives special treats, coupons, passes and trips to students who perform well in their classes. The MUN (Model United Nations) allow students to participate with other students to run a mock United Nations meeting. Students make decisions and discuss world events. MUSS (Model United States Senate) allow the students to take the roles of senators. They present bills and learn the process of the congressional house. Cultural awareness and appreciation are emphasized in our study trips. You may also join the following clubs and activities:

School-Age Services program provides care for school-age youth, ages 6-12 yrs. Youth Employment

There is an active Youth Summer Hire Program. This is a 7 week long program for ages 14-23, unmarried US and non US citizens. Children, Step-children, adopted children and children under guardianship of the sponsor or spouse stationed in Germany may apply. All applicants must submit an application with CPO in Ansbach.

There is also a hire-a-teen program that helps enhance employment opportunities. The teen center maintains a job bank with teen job information and will refer you out to the community as needed. You must submit a Hire-a-Teen application and an agreement must be signed by the parents.

As long as you are 12 years and older you may become a certified baby-sitter.

The teen center offers a variety of volunteer jobs: * Teen sponsorship * Teen discovery * Teen panel * We even have a teen newsletter printed each month.

Youth Centers

The hours for the Youth Services facility vary depending upon the program. After school intramurals and fitness include swimming, street hockey, indoor soccer (Mar, Apr), presidential fitness award (May), indoor mod. baseball (Jan-Feb). In the summer, activities include Adventure Plus Camp, day camp and trips. The families can get involved in YS with their Families Skate Day, Family Jamboree, Holiday Programs and Family Night Dinners. Life out and around Ansbach High School is never dull. Students can travel throughout Europe easily. Tours leave the Ansbach/Illesheim area frequently and the local train station is close to post. The Ansbach mall is also approximately 30 minutes from the post and has about 40 stores. Students can ride the train and go to the Nuernberg mall or visit one of the many shops in the old section of downtown Nuernberg.

If you are interested in sports we have 10 different Varsity Sports. The Cougar Wrestling Team has been the Division III Champions for the past SIX years. The 1998 Ansbach Cougars Women's Basketball Team won the Division III Championship.

Summer hire is available to teens over the age of 14. This program gives teens the opportunity to experience a variety of jobs. Other jobs that are available to teens are bagging at the Commissary, Food Court, or Burger King in Ansbach.

You will need a stateside driver's license before you can apply for a USAREUR license. Attaining your license through the German economy is very expensive and time consuming.

Only children twelve years of age and over can attend children under the age of nine years. Children under eighteen (18) years of age have a curfew from Sunday through Thursday 2200 hours to 0600 hours and 2300 hours to 0600 hours Friday and Saturday. They must be indoors during these hours.

**DRESS CODE AND DISCIPLINE POLICY
EFFECTIVE 31 AUGUST 1998**

1. Clothing will be clean, neat, serviceable (no holes, tears, slits deliberately cut, frayed or ragged), and worn properly.

2. Students will not be allowed to attend class(s) if inappropriate clothing is worn to school. Parents will be notified immediately to bring in appropriate items of clothing. Items such as sunglasses, gloves, hats, jackets, etc. may be confiscated and can be reclaimed at the end of the school day. Students are expected to store these items in their locker. The following items will not be worn.

a. Extreme or provocative styles of dress including bare midriff, mesh shirts or tops, tube tops, halter tops, tank tops; blouses, shirts or skirts made of see-through materials; skirt lengths shorter than mid-thigh; gym shorts or shorts not considered dress shorts; tops or T-shirts designed as under clothes; sports tank tops worn alone (over a T-shirt is acceptable); No skirts or dresses with slits past mid-thigh; No bra-less look; No backless or strapless dresses; No exposing of any underclothing (bra, underwear, sports bra); spandex type dresses or spandex shorts; beach wear; No ill fitting clothing-too large or too small.

b. Clothing that encourages or promotes cigarettes and other tobacco products, beer/alcohol, or drug use will be worn. This includes symbols and brand names.

c. Clothing or accessories that (1) depicts or promotes violence (2) suggests racial prejudice using symbols, graphic or words (3) has printed obscenities in graphics or words (4) depicts sexual connotations will not be worn. This also includes spiked clothing and collars, pins and buttons, metal chains attached to any article of clothing, belt loops or wallets where the chain hangs loose from the body.

d. All hats or any head covering (including stocking caps, bandanas, nylons, hairnets, caps, sun-visors), gloves and sunglasses will not be worn or carried in the school building at any time.

e. Foot-wear that would be considered unsafe or unsanitary: flip flops, shower shoes, bedroom slippers, thongs or sandals without heel straps. Athletic shoes or boots that are manufactured with buckles, shoe strings, or clasps, will be buckled, clasped or tied securely to the foot at all times.

f. Belts will be secured inside the belt loops. Pants without belt loops must be able to stay up at the waist without use of a belt. The waist-line is defined as 2"

below the navel. An extra long belt, where there is more than 6 inches of belt from the buckle, is not allowed.

3. It is not allowed for shorts, sweats, pants or hip huggers to be pulled down below the waist-line (2" below the navel) or sagging regardless of what the student may be wearing under them or over them. Jumpers and overalls must be fully worn with all side fasteners buttoned or zipped and with both straps on the shoulder.

4. For appropriate length of shorts, dresses and skirts: extended both arms down besides the legs. The hemline should extend below the longest fingers of both hands, or measure 5 inches from the middle of the knee cap.

5. Any clothing, hats, bandanas or other paraphernalia that is worn in such a manner as to represent or indicate gang affiliation is not allowed, and includes the following:

- a. A right or left shoe untied with laces hanging loose.
- b. A right or left pants leg rolled up.
- c. A glove worn on a right or left hand.
- d. A right or left sock pushed down into the shoe/boot.
- e. All handkerchiefs/bandanas displayed (tied to a belt-loop, wrapped & tied around a leg or arm) to reflect gang affiliation.
- f. Extra long belts, or material used as a belt, where the length hangs on either the right or left side of the body.
- g. "Paraphernalia" may include jewelry, tattoos (should be covered), hair do's, eyebrow shaving, etc.

6. Gang related items will be confiscated, reported to the Military Police, and return only to the parents.

7. Any items associated with potentially illegal activities will be turned over to the Military Police.

This dress code is not designed to inhibit students in self-expression in any way, but is designed to ensure a safe, considerate, and non-distracting academic environment. " Dress for success."

Survival Tips for First Termers Overview

Following are some "Survival Programs" to help you and your family as you face the challenges and opportunities of your new duty station. Take advantage of all the services that are provided FREE of charge through the military.

This program gives you hands on to using the public transportation system. We also explore the history of Bad Windsheim and get to know where some practical places are located and how to get there.

Before You Move

As soon as you receive your orders visit your ACS Relocation Counselors. They have an extensive array of services and resources available for you including a SITES (Standard Installation Topic Exchange Service) booklet on your new duty station, information on planning a move, Welcome Packets, lending closets, etc. Learn as much about your new duty assignment and community as possible before arriving.

Contact the Transportation Management Office Household Goods section for an appointment with a counselor to schedule your household goods move. During your counseling session your counselor will provide a great deal of information. Pay attention to details, take notes, ask questions and follow instructions. Failure to follow their instructions can be costly for you in time and money.

If you are living in government or economy housing, notify your landlord, rental agent or Housing Office of your Permanent Change of Station (PCS) and anticipated date of departure. If there is a military clause in your lease, you must give this notification in writing.

Request a sponsor from your new duty station. This person will be a vital link to your new home. Your sponsor will send you specific information on your

new duty location and community. He or she will assist you when you arrive.

Start a calendar for your move. Include items to remember such as time for friends and relatives, verify that the on-base and off-base post offices have your change of address cards, utility cut off dates, school records for your children, travel arrangements for your pets, etc.

Notify your friends, relatives, credit card companies, and any magazine companies of your upcoming move. Try to sell, give away, or store anything you don't want to take to your new assignment.

If you get married before you PCS, you MUST inform your commander and follow the procedures exactly as you are given them. The military WILL NOT PAY for travel and housing of your spouse if you do not follow proper procedures.

This is not everything you need to remember! Check with your Relocation Counselor at ACS. He or she will provide you with relocating checklists and other helpful publications to assist you with remembering all the details!

After You Arrive

Contact Army Community Service (ACS). We will have all the information you'll need once you arrive at your new duty station. Contact the Housing Office BEFORE making any arrangements for housing. Notify the Household Goods Inbound section of your new address and check on the status of your household goods. Have they arrived? Are they in storage? How do you file a claim if there is damage?

Once you've found a house or apartment and your possessions have arrived, the job of getting acquainted with your new neighborhood begins. On moving-in day, if you have small children, you might want to make arrangements for child care. Older children might want to help by checking off boxes as they come in or unpacking the special box of their belongings. Be at your home before the movers arrive. Have an idea of where you want things placed - the movers will only put your couch in one place. Check your belongings carefully and make sure to note on the inventory any damaged or missing items so you can file a claim. Check any high valuable items, such as TV, stereo before the movers leave.

So many things to remember! You will find that services and procedures vary from base to base. Most importantly, remember help is just a phone call away.

When in doubt - ask. Call your ACS staff anytime. If they do not know, they will find out.

Reporting Procedures

YOU NEED TO INPROCESS THROUGH 64TH REPLACEMENT IN RHEIN MAIN AIR BASE, FRANKFURT EVEN IF YOU HAVE A PIN-POINT ASSIGNMENT.

Storck Barracks is located approximately 200 miles SE of Frankfurt. If you are arriving by commercial air transportation into Frankfurt Int'l Airport you, there is a shuttle service 7 days a week between the airport and Rhein Main. Go to the military liaison located in the international baggage claim Area B in Terminal 1 to get information on times. The 64th Replacement will inprocess you and get you on a bus to Illesheim. Once in Illesheim the in/out processing personnel will pick you up along with your sponsor.

If you arrive on the weekend at Frankfurt the 64th Replacement will accommodate you for the weekend and you will inprocess on the first duty day.

Servicemembers will need their orders, 201 file, dental, medical and educational file and leave form. A checklist will be issued with inprocessing instructions. Servicemembers must report in duty uniform.

Remember if you get lost or need assistance there is a military information desk at the Frankfurt Airport and a USO office on Terminal 1 Concourse C, both of these facilities speak English and they are there to help you.

Travel Planning

Learn as much as you can about your new assignment. The SITES program and a sponsor will do a great deal to help you in this area. Once you get

your orders, head straight to the Transportation Office to set up your travel arrangements. Remember you MUST inprocess through Frankfurt.

Contact your sponsor so they can help you answer any other questions you have that the Welcome Packet does not address. Check with your current banking facility as to their policy about banking with them from overseas. Check out what type of financial delays would be involved. Here in Illesheim we have Community Bank and they offer the same services you will find at most banks in the states.

Send out change of address cards, and update your personal address and phone book.

Vehicle Ownership

Military members are authorized to import one vehicle. You may register up to two vehicles. Once your vehicle is registered through Vehicle Registration you can purchase gas coupons at the Post Exchange. These coupons are valid at ESSO gas stations in Germany and the Neatherlands. You may also use them at BP gas stations on the Autobahns (German highways) only in Germany. Minimum liability insurance required by German law is DM 1,000,000/1,500,000 for personal injury, DM 400,000 for property damage, and DM 40,000 for consequent damages. Collision and comprehensive insurance are not required by law but may be desirable to protect the value of your automobile.

If you have a valid ID card and a stateside driver's license, you can apply for a USAREUR Driver's License by visiting the Driver's Testing Office. US military personnel and their family members are governed by both German Traffic Laws and Military Traffic Laws.

POV's will be inspected for basic safety, condition and reliability. For an easy inspection and to make your transition smooth, if your car needs any work done, do it prior to shipment. Items that are required are: Warning Triangle and First Aid Kit.

Housing and Billeting

There are no billeting facilities in Illesheim. If you need temporary living accommodations when you arrive call your sponsor to make prior arrangements.
